Our Lady of Victory Hospital is a vital and important community asset for Clark County and the surrounding counties.

The second is the transformation of our Member Appreciation Day, which is held in the beginning of October, celebrating Cooperative Month. We were able to transform the event from a Friday afternoon of brats for 100 to 150 members to a fun family event for all members. We have been serving a wonderful pancake breakfast to between 800 and 900 people over the last several years. The event includes information on health care, as well as heating and cooling products from our Appliance & Satellite Store. The giant inflatables, with the face and pumpkin painting, have been big hits with our kids. I don't want to forget my firefighters and EMTs from Greenwood, who brought fire trucks and checked blood pressures and talked about fire safety with our members and the kids.

## Happy Retirement, Kenny

After 38 years at Clark Electric Cooperative, Journeyman Lineman Kenny Martini is hanging up his hard hat and climbing hooks. Kenny has been a hard-working employee over his 38 years at Clark Electric Cooperative, said Director of Operations Mike Ruff.

Kenny talked recently about the changes he's seen over the last 38 years as a lineman for Clark Electric.


One of the biggest changes has been the type of equipment used to build and maintain the distribution system.

“At the beginning, very little ‘hot work’ was done, and we did a lot of climbing,” he said. “Management would make an announcement on the radio that a certain area would be out of power due to repairs, then we would de-energize the line and make the repairs, with a lot of climbing up and down the poles.”

Kenny said as the years went on linemen started working out of digger derrick/bucket trucks, which meant they could perform “hot work” while making the repairs.

“This allowed pole testing and replacements to take place while doing the repairs energized,” he said. “This made the system better for the members, and it helped speed up our work.”

One of the most memorable events Kenny recalls was the ice storm in October of 1991 that he went to work on. Crews from Clark Electric were called upon to help Freeborn-Mower Electric Coopera-

tive in rebuilding after this devastating ice storm. They spent a week and half totally rebuilding the system from east to west. Crews from all over the place came to help, Kenny told us. “It was just unbelievable—everything covered with ice and down on the ground,” he said.

Kenny plans on enjoying his retirement by spending time with his wife, kids, and grandchildren. There might even be some time for fishing on his boat. We at Clark Electric Cooperative wish Kenny the best in his retirement. ■

Clark Electric Cooperative has some of these units in stock that you can purchase for \$32. This is a great way to see where you can save! ■




